Member Profile: Lance Jesse -- Q and A

#### Q. How many years have you been growing orchids?:

A. I became interested in Orchids somewhere in the mid eighties. At that time the Orchid Society was meeting at the garden center at Loose Park near the Country Club Plaza. This was only a few blocks from my home, and I just dropped by one Sunday afternoon to see what was going on. There were beautiful plants on display and interesting people. I was hooked.

#### Q. How many orchids are in your collection?:

A. I have probably around 50 orchids, mostly in the cattleya family, but also some Phals and Oncidiums.

#### Q. Give a brief description of their growing environment:

A. I grow on an old fashioned sleeping porch on the south side of our house. It is a room with windows on three sides. I have a small exhaust fan in one of the windows, and additional fluorescent lights for added light. I take most of the plants outside during the summer where they sit on the East side of my house under a 50% shade cloth

### Q. Name one to three in your collection which is a/are particular favorite(s) and why:

A. My favorite orchids are the ones that bloom regularly for me. I like Brassavola nodosa for its wonderful fragranc, and I like Ascosenda Yip Sum Wa for its color and frequency of bloom. I also have some lost-tag plants that always seem to bloom well, but I have no idea what they are. I like them anyway.

# Q. Name one to three in your collection that, despite your best efforts, has/have proven particularly difficult to grow:

A. The orchids I have found most frustrating are the terrestrials. I can keep them going for a while, but they always seem to go down hill over time. Maybe I'm not watering them correctly?

#### Q. Share with readers your best orchid culture tip(s):

A. A growing tip that I would share is to keep your media free draining and to watch your watering. If you have a lot of light and good air circulation you can water often, otherwise you are better off holding back on the water.

#### Q. What do/did (if retired) you do in life to support your orchid addiction?:

A. When I'm not tending orchids, I help run our family Greeting Card Business, or I'm out in the field gathering seeds of native plants for the Kansas City Wildlands restoration efforts, or I may be fishing, or working on my prairie restoration project in the Ozarks.

#### August 1, 2006 OSGKC Executive Committee Minutes

  - 5. **The Budget** requires adjustment to reflect increased costs for guest speakers if the society is to meet the standards of past program slates.
