Culture Tips by Frank Serra

Orchid's Full Name: Miltonia Spectabilis V. Moreliana Royalty (4N) AM/AOS X Seminole Blood Everglades Chief.

*Watering*: The plant is watered every two to three days.

Temperature (include info on differential temp needs), Light and Fertilizing: Temperature, light and fertilizing are similar to Cattleya. The plant spends its summer hanging in a tree and exposed to the elements.

*Atmosphere* (i.e., breezy or not, etc.): Grows well in warm greenhouse with good air movement.

Other helpful and/or interesting information



about this orchid: This plant is mounted on a block of oasis which is covered with sphagnum moss.

### Program Report October 19th

#### The Orchids of Ecuador

Ecuador is a small, magnificent country with incredible biodiversity. Habitats range from dry scrub forest to lush Andean cloud forest, to deep jungle. The country's 14 national parks and reserves cover 12% of the national territory

This talk will showcase orchids from two distinct areas: (1) the highlands north of Quito and (2) the species-rich southern Ecuador cloud forest, in and around Podocarpus National Park and lower valleys around Vilcabamba. You'll also see a bit of the Latin American Orchid Congress held in Quito.

Nina is well known in the orchid world as the editor of "The Stanhopea Pages" website. She is an accredited judge with the American Orchid Society and has grown orchids for 35 years, half of that time in Houston. Nina began as a member of the North Jersey Orchid Society, later joined the Triangle OS in NC, then the New Orleans OS, and the Houston OS, where she is a past-president. She grows a mixed collection in a twin-wall polycarbonate and steel greenhouse, a shadehouse, and outdoors.

Among the Ecuadoran orchids in her collection are Cattleyas (*iricolor*, *maxima*); Elleanthus; Epidendrums (vespa); Maxillarias; Pleurothallids; Sobralias (*fimbriata*, *melanothrix*, *virginalis*); and Stanhopeas (*anfracta*, *embreei*, *florida*, *grandiflora*, *impressa*, *jenischiana*, *tricornis*, *wardil*).

Nina will be bringing plants for sale.
